Instructions

Stephen Krashen

Stephen Krashen, professor emeritus at the University of Southern California, is the most influential voice in the field of Second Language Acquisition (SLA). He is a linguist, educational researcher, and political activist.

Krashen believes that there is no fundamental difference between the way we acquire our first language and our subsequent languages. He claims that humans have an innate ability that guides the language learning process. Infants learn their mother tongue simply by listening attentively to spoken language that is (made) meaningful to them. Foreign languages are acquired in the same way.

Krashen has won numerous awards for his contributions to the field of SLA. In 2005, he was inducted into the International Reading Association's Reading Hall of Fame.
